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Grant Types:

- Formula – based upon USED numeric criteria
 - Number of students (poverty concentration, Special Ed. Category, etc.)
- Competitive – recipient applies through an application based on USED stated objectives
- Eligible Reimbursement – eligible expenses are reimbursed by USED or USDA.



Grant Requirements:

- Spending Commitments
 - Maintenance of Effort (Title I, IDEA)
 - Any match funding committed to in a competitive grant application
 - Matching of Formula Grants (IDEA, admin. match)



Grant Requirements:

- Spending Restrictions:
 - Formula, Purpose of Grant – outlined in Grant Award
 - Competitive – outlined in Grant Application and requested budget
 - Compliance Regulations – general rules for spending federal dollars that apply to all grants
 - Circulars: A-133, A-87 (Single Audit)
 - Supplanting restrictions, Comparability, etc.



GRANT PROCESS

- **Federal Grant Notification Received**
- **State Board of Education (SEA) approves Allocations**
- **GADOE's Program Manager approves LEA's local budget entered into the Consolidated Application**
- **Funds available to draw**

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History of School Meals

- The National School Lunch Act (NSLA) was passed in 1946
- Renamed the Richard B. Russell NSLA in 2004
- Purpose: to provide free and affordable lunches to children throughout the school day and to encourage the domestic consumption of agricultural commodities
- The School Breakfast Program (SBP) was piloted in 1966 and received permanent authorization in 1975

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

National Statistics

- Over 30 million students participate in the NSLP every day in over 100,000 schools nationwide
- Over 5 billion lunches served under the NSLP
- Studies show that students participating in the NSLP eat ***twice as many servings of vegetables*** at lunch as non-participants



Georgia Statistics 2013

- \$670,140,265 in Federal funds sent to Georgia for school meals
- 203,874,458 total lunches served annually
- 59% of the students are eligible for a free or reduced-price meal
- 1.15 million lunches served daily
- 70.6% of all students participate in lunch
- Ranked 5th nationwide for lunch
- 554,334 breakfasts are served daily
- 36% of students participate in breakfast
- Ranked 5th in the nation for breakfast

Percentage (%) of Eligible Free and Reduced Students FY 2007 - SY 2013




Percentage Increase From 2007 to 2013 = 18.78%

Local Revenue Federal Revenue




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Average Plate Cost = \$2.87

Free Reimbursement Rate = \$2.88




■ Avg. Plate Cost
